Our story

In February 1996 a group of parents attended a public meeting by All Children Together (ACT) and formed a steering committee to commit to opening a post-primary integrated school in the North Down and Ards area.

With the active support and backing of the Northern Ireland Council for Integrated Education, the Integrated Education Fund and ACT, Strangford Integrated College first opened its doors on 1st September 1999, with 64 students, 6 full-time members of staff and a school secretary.

In September 1999, after three years of campaigning, lobbying and fundraising, the Department of Education awarded us 'maintained status'. This was a significant milestone in the College's development.

In September 2022, we celebrated our 25th anniversary of providing all-ability integrated education for children in the Ards, North Down and Peninsula areas. We have come a long way since we opened our doors and we are indebted to the group of parents who forged ahead with their vision for a new integrated school in Carrowdore.



A school for all the family

From September 2024 we will be selecting students for the Grammar Pathway using the Schools' Entrance Assessment Group (SEAG) test results.

The Grammar Pathway equates to 35% of our Year 8 intake or 46 places. This means that parents can now choose a formal grammar pathway in an integrated setting for their child. 65% of our Year 8 intake or 84 places will be admitted to our All-Ability Pathway with no reference to the SEAG test.

Close attention is paid to the needs of all students whichever pathway, Grammar or All-Ability they are admitted on to. Suitable teaching support programmes are drawn up in line with the students' requirements. This includes the development of a broad and balanced curriculum. A variety of vocational and academic subjects are available for GCSE and A Level and students can choose a blend of subjects.

New build progress

The New Build Programme supported by Fresh Start funding and the Department of Education is progressing well.

Our contractor was appointed on 1st August 2023 and we will see significant progress from Spring 2024. The new build will be located to the rear of the College. The first phase is due to be completed by September 2025 which will see the majority of the school move to the new building. The second phase is due to be completed by December 2026. We look forward to moving into state-of-the-art facilities.

The new school build will enable us to provide enhanced facilities and opportunities for our young people on the existing site including a separate sports hall, 3G hockey pitch, rugby, GAA and football pitches.

We are thankful for the funding and the commitment from the Department of Education to grow and develop Integrated Education in North Down, Ards and the Peninsula.

The first phase is due to be completed by September 2025 which will see the majority of the school move to the new building, before the final phase is completed in 2026.



Leading the way

A Culture of Leadership

Leadership development is integral to our culture at Strangford Integrated College. Our Prefects are more than just figureheads. They lead our students and represent us at public occasions.

There are a wide variety of leadership roles for students to assume across all year groups.

Our four houses are led by House Captains, and this system brings our students together in mixed age group events. The opportunity to become a prefect is open to all our 6th Formers.

The House System





Your learning journey begins here

Key Stage 3 Curriculum

The Key Stage 3 Curriculum at Strangford Integrated College is exciting, challenging and motivating. Students experience a supportive and creative learning environment which provides them with numerous and varied opportunities to express themselves and develop as independent learners, to work collaboratively and to develop an enquiry-based approach to learning. These skills provide the foundations for success at GCSE and A Level. The Northern Ireland Statutory Curriculum is fully catered for at Key Stage 3.

In Year 8, students at Strangford Integrated College will study:

Key Stage 4 Curriculum

At Strangford Integrated College, students are encouraged to identify and use their preferred learning styles in order to best utilise their abilities. The College provides additional support through tracking, target setting, transition and mentoring programmes.

Throughout the year, programmes of revision are provided. Intensive revision classes are held throughout the exam season, and students are encouraged to show independence in their learning, organisation and motivation.

At Key Stage 4, we strive to ensure that students can choose subjects tailored to their particular interests, strengths and career aspirations. GCSE pathways are created to reflect the all-ability nature of the College. Extensive use of data ensures that students embark on the most suitable pathway to guarantee individual success.

Some students choose to follow an academic pathway, whilst others opt for a blended pathway that includes traditional subjects alongside the more vocational ones.

All GCSE pathways have a core curriculum of English, Maths, Science, Religious Studies, Physical Education, Personal Development and Careers. All pathways offer a full range of GCSE and Level 2 courses, both academic and vocational and aim to prepare students for A-Level.

Students are given a school managed iPad to support learning and teaching. This encourages them to be more independent in their studies and to access a wide range of subject specific research materials.

The final Key Stage 4 subject selection is decided after close consultation with students, their parents and careers advisor.

Our curriculum offer is reviewed annually.

Learning Support

As an all-ability school, we ensure that each student is valued and supported to reach their full potential.

The Head of Learning Support liaises across all subjects, and links with Teaching and Learning Assistants, external support agencies and most importantly parents.

Learning Support involves whole class provision, in-class support and withdrawal provision for Literacy, Numeracy and Newcomers. We also work in partnership with a number of external agencies. Our Learning Support Department endeavours to support students to experience success in all aspects of school life.

Pastoral Care

Strangford Integrated College is child-centred with a whole school approach to the pastoral care of our students. Building up the students' self-awareness and sense of responsibility, we ensure that all students benefit from their experience in the school environment.

All teachers in the College have a pastoral responsibility, providing a caring atmosphere for our students and by being sensitive to the needs of each individual child. Each student has a form tutor who is the primary link between home and college.



Form tutors look after the welfare needs, academic progress, attendance and behaviour of each child in their form class. Tutors from each year group form a team under the Head of Year who monitors the overall progress of each student. Heads of Year, form a team under the Head of Pastoral Care.

Additional support is always available from our Head of Learning Support, Safeguarding team, Assistant Vice Principals and Vice Principals.

Pastoral care is at the heart of everything we do in Strangford Integrated College. We know our students well and ensure that they feel highly valued and secure at all stages of their school lives.

School Counselling Service

The College employs the services of a Student Counsellor provided by Family Works. Family Works maintain a strict code of confidentiality and its services are available to all students in the college. Students can be referred by the pastoral team or make use of the self-referral service.

Sixth Form

We are fortunate to have a thriving expanding Sixth Form.

Our curriculum is continually developing and is reviewed annually to meet demand and expectation. Students entering Sixth Form have a choice from a range of subjects at A Level and BTEC Level 3. Students also participate in an Enrichment Programme and have access to careers education, information and guidance.

Private supervised study is facilitated in a Sixth Form study area. The effective use of private study is a key factor in determining a student's performance in Sixth Form.

Our Common Room is a social space for Sixth Form students to unwind and relax.

We operate a prefect system, under the leadership of the Head Boy, Head Girl and their deputies. Our Head Boy and Head Girl are more than mere figure heads: they lead our students and represent the College at public occasions.

As well as our Deputy Head Boy and Girl, we have House Prefects and Senior Prefects who are role models for the younger students. In Year 13,we host a residential at Lorne House and in Year 14, a residential at Corrymeela. Both of these experiences give students the opportunity to reflect on their time at Strangford Integrated College and how the values of an integrated college can transfer to society.

I moved to Sixth Form from Blackwater Integrated College. My previous school was very small so it was a big change for me but I soon felt at home. It feels like a community here.
